When a Loved One Dies

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INTRODUCTION

The death of a loved one is a very painful time; perhaps even one of the most difficult things we may ever have to deal with. Death, however, is an experience that every human must face, as it is a part of life. As Scripture says, "There is a time for every matter under heaven; a time to be born and a time to die,... a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to mourn and a time to dance." (Ecc. 3:1.2.4)

Grief can seem like an unbearable experience, but it is a good, normal and natural response to loss.

In the first hours of grief, the family may feel confused or lost.

Staff chaplains are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to support you through this difficult time, and can be requested through any member of your health care team. St. Joseph's Health Centre recognizes there are different cultural and religious practices surrounding death and dying and invite you to share them with us.

We have also prepared some information that may be helpful for you.

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ARRANGING A FUNERAL

One of the first things you will wish to do after hearing of a loved one's death is to choose a funeral home. The funeral director will contact the hospital and sign the necessary documents for the release of the body. You and/or your family members will be invited to go to the funeral home to complete the arrangements.

Information that a funeral director will need:

- 1. Did the deceased have a pre-arranged funeral agreement?
- 2. Information about the deceased person:
 - Name
 - Date of birth
 - Marital status
 - Place of Birth
 - Family doctor
 - Social Insurance Number.
- 3. Information about the deceased person's parents:
 - Father's name
 - Mother's name
 - Father's place of birth
 - Mother's place of birth
- 4. Did the deceased wish burial or cremation?
- 5. With the family, decide:
 - What financial resources are available (bank accounts, insurances, pensions, etc.)
 - Day and time you wish to hold the funeral service
 - Person you wish to conduct the service
 - People you wish to take part in the service
 - Music leader, hymns
 - Readings
 - Pallbearers (6)

If you are not affiliated with a religious institution, the funeral director can make arrangements with the clergy on your behalf.

A list of local funeral homes is included in this booklet.

Organ Donation

Your consent to organ donations is an act of profound generosity. You may be contacted by Trillium Gift of Life if your loved one is a candidate for organ donation. Before making a contribution, ask questions and express any concerns.

Autopsy

The coroner has the legal authority to order an autopsy when it is required for legal purposes.

Staff must be informed of family-requested autopsies prior to sending the deceased one to the funeral home. Please note that there is a fee for this service.

Death Certificates

The funeral home will receive the Medical Certificate of Death that was completed by the doctor who confirmed that your loved one has died. The funeral home will then issue a Proof of Death Certificate and provide several original copies to you. A copy of the official death certificate can be obtained by contacting the Registrar General of Ontario at 1-800-461-2156 or 416-325-8305, or online at www.serviceontario.ca.

Arranging a Funeral through Social Assistance

The City of Toronto Employment and Social Services provides financial assistance on behalf of deceased Toronto residents who do not have sufficient funds in their estate to fully cover the cost of a basic funeral, burial and/or cremation.

BEFORE making funeral arrangements, contact Ontario Works. It is recommended that an appointment is made with the local office to find out what is needed.*

You will need the following documents and information when you visit the Social Assistance Office:

- Birth certificate
- Social Insurance Number •
- Sources of income or investments (i.e. cheque stubs, bonds, GICs, RRSP)
- Health card •
- Updated bank book or name and address of bank and account • number
- Proof of citizenship, passport, landed immigrant •
- Life insurance policy •
- Proof of death letter from the hospital's booking office, • emergency registration

PEOPLE TO NOTIFY

Before the Funeral:

- 1. Contact the funeral home of your choosing
- 2. Contact the executor of the estate/power of attorney, as the will may contain information needed for the funeral
- 3. Contact clergy
- 4. Contact a lawyer to update your will and power of attorney if necessary and for any other legal needs.

- 5. Contact the Department of Veterans Affairs if the deceased was receiving veterans' benefits
- 6. Contact the deceased's employer and inquire about any existing pensions

After the Funeral:

- 7. Contact life insurance companies about held policies and update beneficiary information
- 8. Contact Service Canada if the deceased or his/her spouse was receiving CPP or OAS
- Contact necessary government offices regarding the deceased ones identification, such as their health card, Social Insurance Card and any passports
- 10. 10. Apply for any eligible survivor or children's benefits
- 11. Contact banks and credit card companies
- 12. Change ownership of properties such as vehicle and real estate .
- 13. Notify utility telephone and cable companies
- **14.** Contact an accountant to file the deceased ones income taxes for the year in which the death occurred.

RESPONSES TO GRIEF

In times of grief, feelings are very deep and very natural.

Shock and denial - "I just can't believe it." Anger - "Why me?", "It's not fair." Emotional release - "I can't stop crying." Pain - "I can't bear it." Fear - "How can I live without?", "What am I going to do?" Guilt -"If only I had done more." Loneliness - "I'm going to miss...." Relief - "I'm glad he/she won't suffer any more."

Know that each one's reaction to the loss is very personal. Do what is right for you. Grieving has no limits. During the time of grief, attend your own needs. Eat well and get sufficient rest. Share your precious memories of your loved one. Within the first year, make major life decisions only when absolutely necessary.

CHILDREN AND GRIEF

Any child old enough to love is old enough to grieve. Children want to be a part of the grieving experience. Encourage them to share their feelings. Answer their questions honestly and clearly. If you do not know the answers to their questions, tell them so. Encourage them to enjoy periods of happiness.

Suggested Aids to Manage Your Grief

- Know that grief is a part of loving.
- Spend time with family and friends.
- Allow yourself the freedom to express your emotions.
- Avoid sedatives.
- Bereavement counselling is available through most funeral homes.
- Some things may trigger sudden bursts of emotion. This is a normal reaction to grief.
- There are some questions for which there are no answers.
- St. Joseph's Spiritual and Religious Care department holds an

Ecumenical Memorial Service four times a year to pray for those who died at the Health Centre during the previous three months. Shortly before the service you will be sent an invitation to join us in remembering your loved one.
