We are excited to introduce our inaugural IPBR annual report. Through the report we are highlighting the achievements, accomplishments and contributions of practice-based research at Unity Health Toronto. The IPBR program provides our frontline nursing and health disciplines clinicians with tools, resources and guidance to pursue a practice based research question. Our metrics for the year signal that we continue to touch on a need and gap identified by our clinicians: in the year, we have consulted over 240 times with over 185 different clinicians and hosted many more at our manuscripts writing boot camps. We offered our flagship research skills workshop series four times throughout the year with 55 attendees. Thank you to all our clinicians and teams who work to grow our culture of discovery at Unity Health Toronto.

The IPBR program is perfectly aligned with our collaborative practice model. It advances our interprofessional strategic care plan which has three priority areas of patient care, education, and research. The IPBR program supports our goal to continually learn from and about other disciplines. I think the program provides a really unique way to bridge research and practice in a very meaningful and tangible way. It also demonstrates our commitment to academic practice and best practice by providing opportunities for clinicians to engage with researchers and research staff to answer their clinical questions. 

Unity Health Toronto recognizes that our frontline clinicians are best able to identify knowledge gaps and opportunities to advance clinical practice. Through various initiatives, the IPBR program is helping to empower our clinicians to carry out research projects relevant to their practice.

DSAA-IPBR Fellowship

We offer clinicians a 6 month competitive research fellowships to carry out a data-driven study of relevance to their clinical units

Research Skills Workshops

Prepare participants to engage in practice based research and generate evidence by providing strategies to devise a research question and plan.

Small Grants Competition

\$5,000 are awarded to interprofessional teams to carry out a practice-based research project over a 2 year period with mentorship from IPBR.

Practice-Based Researchers


Formalized research appointments to help integrate research/clinical practice, recognize our clinicians engaged in research activity, and reduce barriers.

Rapid Review Initiative

Status of Ongoing Projects






MANUSCRIPT WRITING WORKSHOP

RAPID REVIEW INITIATIVE

This initiative provides nursing and health disciplines clinicians an opportunity to learn about the process of conducting a rapid review and go through the steps with the support of trained researchers. Topics relate to various broad issues within healthcare that are relevant to clinicians and can affect patient care. This initiative typically runs for approximately 3-4 months.

UHT's Collaboration with WeRPN

IPBR has worked closely with the Registered Practical Nurses of Association of Ontario (WeRPN) this year and has been recognized for several research milestones.

This award is presented to an organization that has contributed in a significant way, or on an ongoing basis to the creation, utilization and/or participation in research that supports or informs practical nursing in Ontario





The IPBR team secured a grant to fund a project titled "Impact of a Novel Nursing Shift Assignment Toolkit on Interprofessional Role Clarity and Collaboration on Acute Care Inpatient Units with a Newly Introduced Registered Practical Nursing (RPN) Role.

Natalie Weiser was a participant on a keynote panel on behalf of the IPBR team at the annual WeRPN Research Symposium.

Professional Models of Care

Unity Health Toronto embarked on a multi-year Professional Models of Care initiative which included an evidence-informed assessment of nursing and health professions workforce needs and evaluation of current models of care. To support the assessment, the IPBR team conceptualized and developed the Interprofessional Patient Care Needs Assessment Tool (IPPCNAT) to gather an understanding of unit level patient care needs. Throughout this initiative, the IPBR team was successful in knowledge dissemination, obtaining a publication and invitation to present the findings of this work at several conferences.



The tool was piloted at SMH and received positive feedback, being spread to SJHC, and further adapted to understand the rehabilitation needs at Providence Healthcare.

Melanie Dissanayake presented a poster titled "Implementation of the IPPCNAT in a Canadian Community-Based Inpatient Acute-Care Setting" on behalf of the IPBR team at The Canadian Association of Health Services and Policy Research Conference in Montreal.




